The religious activities on the campus are designed to include a large number of students in a variety of worthwhile spiritual functions. The church choir, singing each Sabbath day and on special occasions such as the candlelight vespers service at the Christmas season, provides a spiritual experience of the highest order.

Students working in the Sabbath School as leaders and teachers receive a training which may be invaluable in later years. Acting as junior ushers, serving with the deacons as custodians in the house of the Lord each Sabbath, young men gain an insight into the practical affairs of running a church.

The temperance organization on the campus of San Pasqual Academy plays an important part in training student leaders and helping students to remain aware of the potential dangers of the use of alcohol, narcotics, and tobacco. Annual activities include an oratorical contest, a poster contest, and an educational field trip.

Other events, such as Sabbath-afternoon discussion groups, MV meetings and activities, sunshine-band meetings, and the Friday-night boys' and girls' prayer circles, are all parts of the organized spiritual life on campus.

In addition to the organized spiritual experiences on the campus are those moments of quiet meditation which are the whole foundation of spiritual growth.

# Wherever He Goes, Dr. Stump

As a boy growing up in the "Wild West" when Arizona was still a territory and men wore six-shooters on their hips, Lawrence Stump used to cool off by swimming in the irrigation ditches near his home. From his parents he learned the respect for authority, the devotion to duty which have stood him in such good stead throughout his long career as an educator. A little girl from Minnesota named Irene Luitjens was playing with dolls, learning how to cook and sew, and developing skills which were to fit her for the busy life which became her lot when, a few years later, she met and married the boy from Arizona.

After he received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Pacific Union College in 1924, Doctor Stump was appointed to his first principalship, at Humboldt Academy in Northern California, where he served until 1930. Here Mrs. Stump, for the first time, held the position of registrar. Doctor Stump had previously served as a teacher, dean of men, and cafeteria and farm manager at Arizona Academy.

In 1930 the Stumps moved to the Philippines where Doctor Stump assumed the presidency of Philippine Union College, and Mrs. Stump was cafeteria manager and teacher—positions they held until they were imprisoned by the Japanese in 1942. In 1932 Doctor Stump received his M. A. degree from the University of the Philippines. During the three years of their imprisonment, Mrs. Stump served as a cook and Doctor Stump as chief of police for the allied forces. He later was cited for bravery for his actions during this period.

After a short period of rest following their dramatic rescue from the Japanese prison camp by paratroopers of the Eleventh Airborne Division, and time out for Doctor Stump to complete the work for his Ph.D. degree at the University of Arizona, the Stumps traveled to South America. Here Doctor Stump acted as Division Educational Secretary of the South American Division from 1946 to 1950. Returning to the United States, the Stumps spent the next three years at Lodi Academy, where Doctor Stump was principal and Mrs. Stump taught in the home arts department. From 1953 until 1960, when they came to our campus, Dr. Stump was president and Mrs. Stump Food Service Director of Atlantic Union College.

Throughout their busy years of activity, the Stumps have remained a symbol of friendly interest and personal encouragement to many, many students who have been under their care. Not only have they taken into their own home a number of young people who needed their love and care, but they have been real advisors and friends to lonely young people struggling for maturity.





# Working With the Board



In the five years the Stumps have been on our San Pasqual Academy campus, our school has changed and grown in many ways. A generous, understanding Board, working with our principal, has helped to bring about the fulfillment of Doctor Stump's "Five-Year Plan," his dream for the improvement of our school plant.

A new swimming pool, several new faculty homes, new chapels and student rooms for each dormitory, re-designed and re-decorated lobbies and parlors for each dormitory, a new sewerage system, and a fine new gymnasium—all of these dreams have become realities in the past five years.

These achievements are a real tribute to the administration of our school. But even more significant than these is the character-building which takes place in the lives of the scores of students who pass through the doors of San Pasqual Academy.

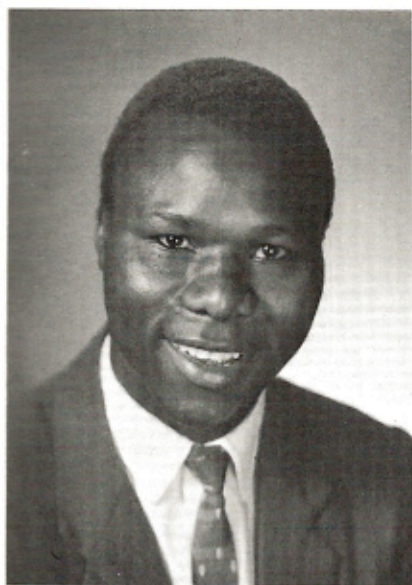

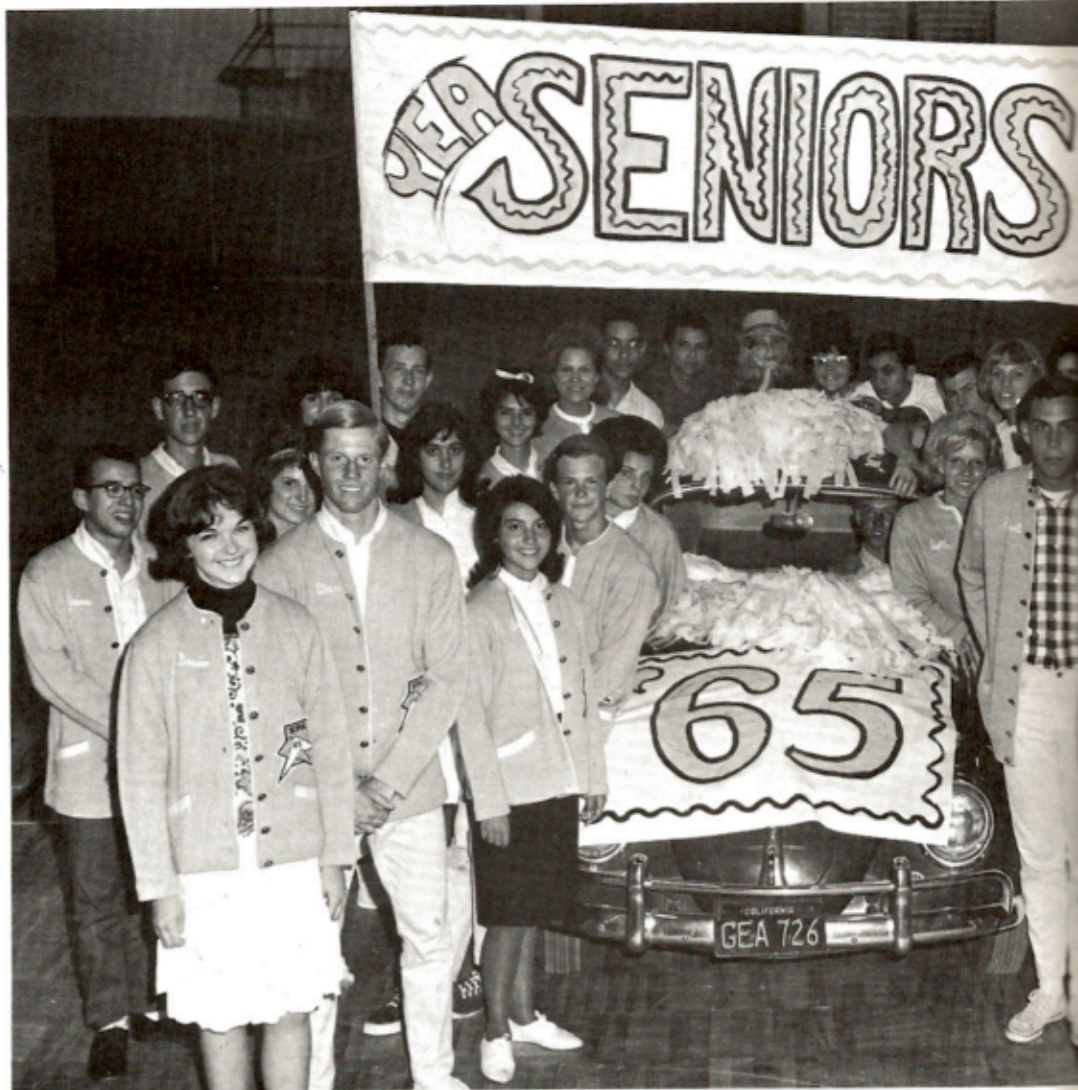
